The fairy tale will be brought into connection with the task that many contemporary women face in analytical practice. This presentation is a deepening of my ISAP Thesis.

Jung and Hilma af Klint</b>	Swedish artist Hilma af Klint (1862-1944) and C.G. Jung (1875-1961) were near contemporaries. By comparing and contrasting Jung's first mandala sketches and drawings, af Klint's Swan Series and woodcuts from the Rosarium Philosophorum, the themes of inspiration, archetypal patterns, alchemy, individuation, and Zeitgeist are brought together, inspiring ways of knowing.
